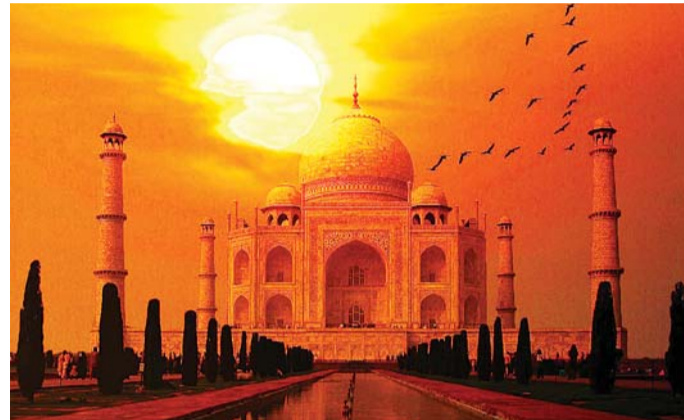

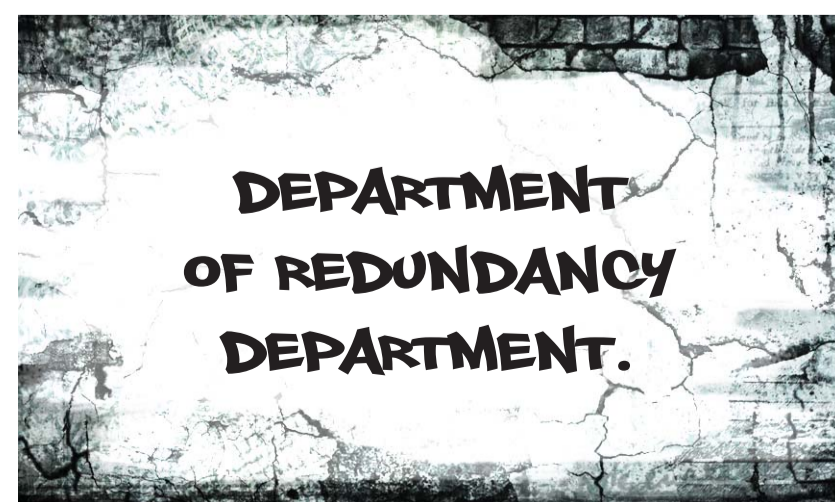

invited him to join in, and the Shah happily played cricket with them for over an hour.

The Shah's connection to India was also reflected in his interest in Indian art and culture. He was an avid collector of Indian art and artefacts, and his collection included pieces from a wide range of regions and time periods. 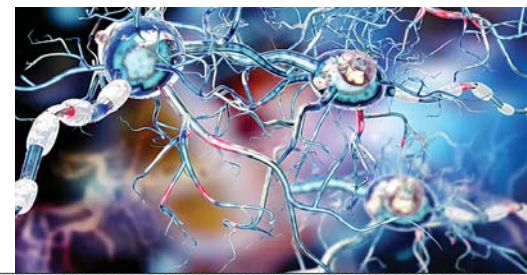
