

Celebrating Rajasthan's Literary Traditions

With the curation of the first-ever Rajasthan Literature Festival, scheduled to be held from 25 March to 27 March in Jodhpur, the Jaipur Virasat Foundation will give an impetus and a new energy to Rajasthani language and literature.

While the festival was announced by the Government of Rajasthan in the budget of 2019, it could not take place owing to the Covid-19 pandemic and is being organized now by the Department of Art. Culture. Literature and Archaeology with Jawahar Kala Kendra as the nodal agency. Owing to its expertise in the area, the Jaipur Virasat Foundation has been engaged as the curator of the festival.

The sessions will focus on an overview of Rajasthani and Hindi literature, moderated talk shows with current writers, authors, playwrights, poets as well as literary critics and scholars. It will include topics like journalism, translation, outreach, training and teaching and poetry recitation. Engineering Industries (NBC). The persona of debonair Raghu Sinha, incorporated charm, polish, and worldliness, often combined with a carefre attitude (think of James Bond). He was "carefree", but a person with high-wire effrontery, the kind that can't be faked.

He was somewhat like Antonio. the title character in Shakespear's The Merchant Of Venice. He was influential, powerful, wealthy but not a merchant. But like Antonio he was kind and generous and honest to all and was loved and revered by all.

Nobody knew his designation, but the Jaipurites knew him as the "whole and sole" of the NBC. The people in Jaipur would relate him as the man who calls the shots on NBC.

Raghu Sinha, his brothers Rangi and Hari, who retired as the Chief Engineers with the Railways were all sons of Basant Behari Mathur, a top police official in the Jaipur state police. After a very successful career as the Director of Rajasthan Tourism, Rangi later served the

My father Gyan Chand Bhandari had a close association with the family and the acquaintance with the family began when Raj Bihari Lal Mathur, the brother-in-law of the Sinha family, was posted in Kharagpur with the Bengal Nagpur Railway as an engineer. Kharagpur, 72 miles from Kolkata, was a railway town built by the Britishers, where they had set up the railways workshop which became Asia's largest steam engine and carriage work-

My family had a very large business in Kharagpur in West Bengal's Midnapur district, set up by my grand father Dhanrup Ma Bhandari and my father Gyan Chand Bhandari. The family had automobile, army and railway contractors, radio, cycles and money lending and finance business and even ice creams.

Since, Raj Bihari Mathur was from Jaipur and our family also had roots in Jaipur, so when he landed in Kharagpur to join as an engineer, my family helped Raj Bihari Lal and his wife Chana Rani settle in Kharagpur where they lived in a large colonial bun-

While serving in the Bengal Nagpur Railway, as South Eastern Railway was then known, Raj Bihari Lal was well liked by the

My father would often drive Raghu Sinhaji to the South Institute and they enjoyed many evenings drinking lemonade and watching western movies in the South Institute. Raghu Sinhaji would play tennis there with European officers. He made friends with a number of European engineers and their families. He was young and handsome and was admired by the young ladies. The Institute had a bar, but Raghuji did not drink. It was the BNR lemonade with cut-

While serving as an apprentice, Raghuji learnt all about the steam engines and the axle boxes in the wagons. There was a Muslim fitter, who was an expert in repairing the axel boxes and bearings and Raghuji learnt the

tennis shoes of brands that no other player had. He would buy tennis rackets and Slazengers were his favourites. He would bring a bagful of Slazenger tennis balls and would give some of them to Surendra "Lala" Golcha, whom he loved like his own son. Lala Golcha's relationship with him was so strong that Raghuji would land at Sohan Sadan on Prithviraj Marg with a boxful of Swiss chocolates for Lala's children. Raghuii developed a heart ailment, and he trusted Lala to plan

Raghuji once told me, how he would travel to Egypt by catching a flight at Jodhpur, where KLM aircraft bound for Egypt from Amsterdam would land for refueling after a long haul. The aircraft during summers would land, not on an airport, but on Balsamand lake. The aircraft would slowly land on the lake water with its lower body fitted with balloons that would keep them afloat. The passengers were taken by boat from the aircraft to a specially built platform. The passengers would stay overnight at Jodhpur's Circuit House which served as a hotel for the airline passengers and take the morning flight, the next morning. The aircraft would take off from the lake and the balloons were withdrawn automatically from the underbelly of the

Raghuji would always travel by plane and would travel to the airport in two cars. One car being sent in advance ahead of the railthe gates of the railway level crossings were closed, Raghuj would alight from his car and cross the railway line and would get in the waiting car carrying his paggage to reach the airport. At times, the departure of the aircraft was delayed by 15 to 20 minutes only to accommodate Raghuji. But after getting into the aircraft, he would smilingly apologise to the other passengers for the inconvenience caused to

He almost never accepted any invitation to be a chief guest and he would never oblige any organi sation. He, however, loved sports and often would agree to be a chief guest of sports events, but would give donations also for holding

I still remember, how he hosted a series of tennis matches of rich American businessmen, who had come on a pleasure trip to Jaipur playing tennis. The American group threw a party at Rambagh's Chinese Room and only three journalists - Abdul Gani Mohammed Yasin and I were invited. It was a party which I still remember

Raghuji was a religious man and loved to hear Bhajans, but was not a connoisseur of music. Once, at the instance of Karpoor Chand Kulish, the owner and editor of Rajasthan Patrika, he hosted an evening of Rita Ganguli's ghazals where he invited his close friends and some friends and members of the Kulish family. Raghu Sinha, lived life king

size and he loved his friends and he helped them. But he donated a large part of his wealth to the selected charities. He built the community hall at Basant Marg in the name of his brother, Hari Sinha and also a tennis court at the Vidyashram and a girl's hostel at Jamdoli. He left a corpus for the Shruti Mandal, for his love for the founder of Shruti Mandal Prakash Chand Surana, one of his close friends.

Raghuji was a towering figure nundreds of people were provided employment in the NBC by him. If NBC became the top bearing man ufacturing company in Asia, a large part of the credit should go to Raghuji. He was admired and oved by all and he helped all. 







